RESOURCE HIGHLIGHT



Minnesota Access Alliance

Accessible Arts & Culture Events (local to Minnesota).

The Minnesota Access Alliance (MNAA) provides <u>an event calendar</u> for patrons who use accessibility accommodations such as Audio Description, Captioning, ASL interpreting and Sensory-friendly accommodations.

You can also receive a monthly calendar email which includes a wide range of upcoming events (some of which are not included on the calendar above). Email info@mnaccess.org and indicate your interest in signing up for the mailing list.

The **Technology Training Access Program (TTAP)** is a grant-funded program from the MN Deaf and Hard of Hearing Services Division specifically for Minnesotans with deafblindness. TTAP provides financial assistance so that deafblind adults and families with deafblind children can access deafblind-related training and technology as needed. The program operates statewide and serves approximately 40 people each year. As a self-directed program, consumers accepted for the program are able choose from allowable services and/or equipment that will help them maintain or increase their independence and participation in the community. Families determine what they need and then complete a purchase agreement detailing what is needed, costs, and goals.

Funding is currently available, and the program is accepting applications. While funds are limited each year, the program budget is renewed annually. Families can access it as needed—you can come back to the program over the years, or even during the current year, for new requests as needs develop and change.
