The CHARGE Syndrome Foundation

CHARGE Syndrome is an extremely complex syndrome, involving extensive medical and physical difficulties that differ from child to child. It is also the largest genetic condition resulting in combined hearing and vision loss (deafblindness).

The CHARGE Syndrome Foundation has a wealth of tools, supports and resources for families. On this <u>For Families page</u>, you'll find information about understanding the new diagnosis, conferences, education, communication, and more!
